


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General Conference Information







Dr. Kimena F. Zate

Dr. Ximena E. Zate was born in Chile where she attended classes throughout her elementary and high school years. After migrating to the USA, she enrolled in the NY State University (SUNY) system and graduated with a BA and MS in Education. Later on, she obtained her Ph.D. in Reading, Language and Cognition, with a specialization in Bilingual/ESL Education from Hofstra University.

Dr. Ximena E. Zate served as Program Administrator and Director of the Bilingual/ESL Technical Assistance Center (BETAC) at the Eastern Suffolk BOCES on Long Island. There, she provided professional development opportunities to ESL and bilingual teachers as well as district administrators in Suffolk County. Dr. Zate was the coordinator and lead writer of several New York State Education Department (NYSED) resource and training guides. Among them, The Teaching of Language Arts to Limited English Proficient Learners: A Resource Guide for all Teachers, and The Learning Standards for Native Language Arts. Furthermore, she led the development of The Guidelines on Implementing The NCLB Reading First Program for LEP /ELLs in New York State.

After her retirement from the NYS Education Department, Dr. Zate became the Director of the Teaching English as a Second Language (TESOL) Teacher Education Program at Stony Brook University. She also taught the TESOL Pedagogical Sequence courses and was the TESOL certification undergraduate and graduate program advisor.

Her vast experience as a Bilingual and ESL teacher, staff developer, curriculum writer, evaluator, administrator, university professor, and active member of educational and professional organizations gave Dr. Zate the opportunity to contribute to the improvement of the education of culturally and linguistically diverse students in New York State. She was an active member of various professional organizations and served as president of the New York State Association for Bilingual Education (NYSABE) and the (Long Island Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development (LIASCD).

Dr. Zate was awarded the Outstanding Hispanic Woman Award by the Latino Children Educational Network (ENLACE). She was also the recipient of the Leadership Award as an outstanding Hispanic educator by ADELANTE of Suffolk County, and was selected Administrator of the Year by Eastern Suffolk BOCES. In the year 2001 Dr. Ximena Zate was the recipient of the NYSABE Gladys Correa Memorial Award.

Dr. Zate's passing was a great loss for the field of Bilingual/ESL Education and was deeply felt by all those whose lives she had touched.





HONORING NYSABE PILLARS

Gladys La Fontaine Correa (1931 - 1977)

Gladys LaFontaine Correa was born in 1931 to Puerto Rican parents who arrived in New York City in the early 1920s. Raised in "El Barrio" (Spanish Harlem), she attended public schools in New York City for her entire education, including P.S. 101 Manhattan, Julia Richman High School (Country School Honor Program), and Hunter College (Honor School). With little fanfare but much admiration, the family took great pride in recognizing that she was the first individual in the LaFontaine family ever to attend college.

After a short period as a social worker, she began her teaching career in her own neighborhood at Dr. Luigi Galvani J.H.S. 83 Manhattan. Colleagues and supervisors were always impressed that in spite of her petite stature, she was a strict disciplinarian and yet the school's most popular teacher with students. Perhaps prophetically, it was the beginning of her lifelong personal philosophy of meeting challenging standards through hard work while at the same time being compassionate and responsive to her students and others as distinctive individuals.

Gladys moved on to become a Spanish teacher at the High School of Commerce in the west side of Manhattan and in a few years was appointed Chairperson of the Foreign Language Department. During this time, she participated in the creation of the Puerto Rican Educators' Association and then contributed toward the establishment of the first high school ASPIRA Club in the city.

In the 1960's, as the national social climate changed dramatically, her energy and focus turned to civil, ethnic and community rights. Moving into the field of organizational and professional development, she conducted seminars and workshops in sensitivity training and human relations throughout the country. Called upon in many stressful community situations, Gladys had the unique ability of humorously invoking her diminutive stature to successfully relieve tension between conflicting parties.

Utilizing this considerable experience nearer home, she assisted in the establishment of Hostos Community College in the Bronx and later fulfilled a similar role at Boricua College in Manhattan. In spite of the debilitating effect of a chronic condition of lupus erythematosus she participated actively in the growing and controversial debate on bilingual education as it developed in the city, the state, and throughout the nation. She was involved in the initial efforts to create the National Association for Bilingual Education (NABE) in the 1970's and also contributed to the early preparations for establishing the New York State Association for Bilingual Education (NYSABE).

During all of this time, Gladys continued in her inimitable loving manner to nurture and guide her only daughter, Diana Correa, through the beginning of her college years. It was a role she undertook for so many years and for so many people that it was not unusual for friends to visit her in the hospital to continue to seek her sympathetic advice and counseling. She was, indeed, the epitome of an intelligent and caring teacher who became an inspirational role model for her students. It was therefore no surprise that when she succumbed to cancer in 1977, at the early age of 46, the leadership of NYSABE chose Gladys Correa as the quintessential bilingual educator to be memorialized with the association's annual award, the Gladys Correa Memorial Award.





Dra. Antonia Pantoja

Antonia Pantoja, Ph.D., was an educator, social worker, feminist, and civil rights. She was the founder of ASPIRA, the Puerto Rican Forum, and Producir. Dr. Pantoja is the first Puerto Rican woman to receive the American Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Born in Puerto Rico, she moved to New York City in 1944. Like many Puerto Ricans emigrating to the United States during World War II, she found a job as a welder in a factory. With a profound interest in education, she applied to and won a scholarship to Hunter College, and eventually earned her Ph.D. in Social Work.

In 1957, Pantoja founded the Puerto Rican Forum, which served as an incubator for organizations and programs promoting economic self-sufficiency. In 1961, she founded ASPIRA (Spanish for aspire), a non-profit organization that promotes a positive self-image, commitment to community, and education. ASPIRA now has offices in six states, Puerto Rico, and its headquarters, the ASPIRA Association, is in Washington, D.C. It has provided approximately 50,000 Latino students with career and college counseling, financial aid, and other assistance, and is today one of the largest nonprofit agencies in the Latino community.

In 1964, Dr. Pantoja shifted her emphasis from self-help programs to the reformation of the educational system. In 1970, she established the Universidad Boricua, which is now known as Boricua College and the Puerto Rican Research Center in Washington, D.C. It has provided approximately 50,000 Latino students with career and college counseling, financial aid and other assistance, and is today one of the largest nonprofit agencies in the Latino community.

In 1972, ASPIRA of New York, under the direction of Dr. Mario Anglada and with the support of Dr. Pantoja, filed a civil rights lawsuit demanding that New York City provide classroom instruction in transitional Spanish for Latino students.

Dr. Pantoja received numerous awards and recognitions including The Hispanic Heritage and the Lifetime Achievement Award from the New York State Board of Regents, and was inducted into the Hunter College Hall of Fame, to name a few. She published her autobiography in2002, Memoir of a Visionary: Antonia Pantoja, where she alluded to being a lesbian and discussed her decision not to go public before then with her sexual orientation. Dr. Pantoja also authored numerous papers and other written work.





HONORING NYSABE PILLARS

Cavmen Dinos

Carmen Dinos's career in education has been rich and diverse. It began in the schools of her native Puerto Rico, where she taught at all levels, and where she also supervised a district's ESL program. It continued in innumerable classrooms, institutions of higher education, community meeting halls, and government offices. Throughout this journey, which spanned a lifetime, her compass was always one of advocacy on behalf of Hispanic children and their families.

In New York City, Carmen's work began in 1963, when the government of Puerto Rico appointed her National Coordinator of Education Programs for the Migration Division in the Department of Labor. There, she developed educational programs for migrant workers and their families and organized communities to collaborate across racial and ethnic divides in order to advance equal opportunities in education. Carmen also promoted federal and local legislation for bilingual education, working with communities to facilitate collaboration with Boards of Education in New York, Massachusetts, New Jersey, and other states throughout the nation, in order to develop programs that met the needs of Hispanic students. Furthermore, Carmen developed pre- and in-service teacher preparation courses for bilingual and ESL teachers in conjunction with institutions of higher education in New York State. When the earliest bilingual classrooms were created, Carmen was again at the forefront. She was appointed Director of Recruitment and Training for Spanish-speaking teachers in order to staff these classrooms.

Another key assignment for Carmen Dinos was that of Executive Assistant to the President of the New York City Board of Education. In this capacity, she provided direction and guidance in matters related to the education of English language learners. Her excellent work led to the creation of the NYC Bilingual Education Office, and to the decentralization and redistricting activities of the NYC school system.

Eventually, CUNY recruited Carmen's services to develop an undergraduate bilingual education program at Brooklyn College as well as a bilingual teacher preparation program for the Elementary Division of the School of Education. She was appointed director of the Elementary Bilingual Teacher Preparation Program, the first registered undergraduate elementary teacher preparation program in the State of New York. During her tenure at Brooklyn College, she served on two major presidential committees aimed at ensuring the inclusion of racial, ethnic and linguistic minorities in all aspects of academic and social college life. She represented the School of Education on the Faculty Council; and served as Assistant to the Provost for Affirmative Action.

Before retiring in the early 2000's, Carmen's advocacy work continued in her role as a consultant for Academic Enterprises in the implementation of the New York State and the NYC Board of Education's Quality Review of Services for English Language Learners (ELLs) and as a member of the newly created NYSED Committee of Practitioners in Bilingual and ELL Education, advising the Commissioner of Education and the Board of Regents on State policy.

The list of positions held by Carmen Dinos are only a sampling of what she has meant to the field of bilingual education in New York and nationally. Long after her retirement, she continued to be an active voice for multilingual students and families. Until life took her away to California, Carmen never missed a NYSABE conference, and one could always find her holding court at her banquet table or in some little corner of the conference hotel lobby. To this day, at 100 years of age, she is still dedicated to bilingual education and you may find her "zooming in" from coast to coast to participate in the NYSABE conference activities.

Keynote Speakers

Dr. Gladys Yacely Aponte is a Kiskeyana-New Yorker and former New York City dual language bilingual public-school teacher. She has a PhD in Urban Education from The Graduate Center, City University of New York (CUNY), and is currently a postdoctoral research scholar at the Children's Equity Project, Arizona State University. Over the past decade, Gladys has worked closely with teachers of multilingual students as an instructor and fieldwork advisor in TESOL and Bilingual Education teacher preparation programs, and as a researcher with CUNY-New York State Initiative of Emergent Bilinguals (NYSIEB). Dr. Aponte's work and research focus on examining and disrupting racist colonial ideologies that shape the schooling of emergent bilingual children. Supported by The National Academy of Education and CUNY Dominican Studies Institute, her dissertation examined how fourth graders in a dual language bilingual school navigate the raciolinguistic stigmatization of Kiskeyanxs (Dominicans). This study highlights the prevalence of oppressive ideologies that position children of color as linguistically inferior and deficient, even in a model of bilingual education that is meant to value and sustain their home language practices.

Mara Sapon-Shevin (www.marasapon-shevin.org) is a Professor of Inclusive Education in the Teaching and Leadership Department of the School of Education at Syracuse University. She also has faculty appointments in Women and Gender Studies, Disability Studies, and Programs for teh Analysis and Resolution of Conflict. The author of over 200 books, book chapters and articles, Mara writes extensively about the fields of full inclusion, cooperative learning, social justice education and teaching for diversity. Mara's most recent books include Condition Critical: Key Principles for Equitable and Inclusive Education (with Diana Lawerence-Brown) which deals with teacher/parent/student resistance to high-stakes testing and other forms of corporate control of education. She is currently completing a book entitled You Put Your Whole Self in: Embodied Social Justice teaching. Mara oversees the Dignity for All Students (DASA) training for preprofessionals at Syracuse University and has directed a project "Creating Safe and Peaceful Schools" working with ten school districts on anti-bullying efforts that have students at the center. Mara also works with faculty in higher education on positive responses to classroom diversity, dealing with microaggressions and creating university classrooms that are truly inclusive. She is the Co-Producer (with Prof. Richard Brever) of a DVD entitled: "And Nobody Said Anything...: Uncomfortable Conversations about Diversity" which is used in faculty training both at Syracuse University and nationally to raise issues of equity and inclusion for faculty. Mara was designated the Founding Senior Fellow on Diversity and Inclusion at Syracuse University and, in that capacity has worked to develop and implements workshops and trainings for faculty on challenging oppression in the university classroom, creating truly inclusive higher education classrooms and responding to faculty and student microaggressions. Mara has presented workshops for faculty on microaggressions and challenging oppression throughout the United States and in Chile, Spain, Australia, and New Zealand.

Dr. Tatyana Kleyn is a Professor of Bilingual Education & TESOL at The City College of New York. She received an Ed.D. from Teachers College, Columbia University in International Educational Development with a focus on Bilingual/Bicultural Education. Tatyana is Principal Investigator for the City University of New York - Initiative on Immigration and Education (CUNY-IIE, pronounced 'eye'). She served as president of the New York State Association for Bilingual Education and was a Fulbright Scholar in Oxaca, Mexico. Tatyana has authored books and articles on immigration, translanguaging, and bilingual education. Her latest book is titled Living, Learning and Languaging Across Borders: Students Between the US and Mexico. Her forthcoming edited book is Lessons from a dual language bilingual school: Celebrando una decada de Dos Puentes Elementary (with Hunt, Jaar, Madrigal & Villegas). Tatyana's work in film as a producer and director includes Living Undocumented Series, Una Vida, Dos Países: Children and Youth (Back) in Mexico, Supporting immigrants in Schools and the Not Too Young video series. Tatyana was an elementary school teacher in San Pedro Sula, Honduras and Atlanta, Georgia. For more information see TatyanaKleyn.com.

Miriam Eisenstein Ebsworth, PhD, is an Associate Professor in the NYU Steinhardt Dept. of Teaching & Learning, Programs in Multilingual Multicultural Studies (MMS). She is the Academic Director and co-founder of the English program for the families of international students at NYU and co-chair of the MLL (formerly ELL) Think Tank, Miriam served as Past Director of PhD Programs in MMS (1995-2019). Miriam is a teacher educator, researcher, and advocate in the area of Bilingual Education, TESOL, Second Language Acquisition, and Applied Linguistics. Her language background includes English, Yiddish (her mother tongue), Hebrew (11 years of bilingual education), Spanish and French. She is currently studying Mandarin. Miriam began her teaching career as a licensed TESOL and Bilingual (Spanish) early childhood teacher in Brooklyn, N.Y. She went on to teach students at risk including multilingual learners and speakers of AAVE at Rutgers University in Newark, NJ. In addition, she taught language teacher education classes at Jersey City State College and Fairleigh Dickinson University and has done teacher supervision in the NY Metropolitan area and in NI. Miriam's research interests include using technology in second-language pedagogy, L2 academic writing, language variation, and intercultural pragmatics. She is a consultant for the UN in the development of Actionthroughwords, a website for English learning, and has appeared in "The Three R's," a film exploring academic language, and the T.V. show, "Public Voice Salon." Miriam has served NYSABE on the Higher Education Committee, and the Advocacy Committee, and is currently the Hebrew language delegate. Miriam's philosophy: "I believe that all learners should have an opportunity to become bilingual and biliterate and that access to learning and literacy through one's L1 is an imperative right. Beyond the incontrovertible evidence that bilingualism is an asset associated with cognitive strength and flexibility, it is only through a multilingual multicultural perspective that we can achieve peace in this world. Never has this been more important than at this moment."

Dr. Xiomara Antuanette Flowers currently serves as a bilingual educator at Northern Parkway School within the Uniondale school district. Dedicated, conscientious, and organized, she prioritizes scholarship and shared learning, supporting children, academically, socially, and emotionally. With a passion for teaching and fostering a growth mindset, Xiomara collaborates eagerly with teachers, administrators, parents, and community members. As a member of a dynamic team piloting the "Dream Keepers" and "Dream Chasers" program, Xiomara, alongside visionary Dr. Jefferson-Issacs, utilized her expertise in Mathematics, Reading, and the Sciences. Xiomara enriches students' knowledge base while improving their attitudes and behaviors both in and out of school. Some of the most memorable projects include the production of a play called "True Colors," a puppet show, "The Nobel Prize," author studies, and research projects. With over twenty-five years of experience as a bilingual teacher, Xiomara maintains excellence in all facets of her career. She advocates for her students' capabilities and promises. As an instructor, mentor, and community pillar, she exemplifies the ethos of "To whom much is given, much is required."

Professional Awards Recipients

Luis G. Quan, Jr. is devoted to ensuring all students receive the highest quality education in a rigorous and culturally responsive setting. Over the past 24 years, he has dedicated his career to educational equity, particularly for bilingual children and their families. After graduating from Yale University in 2000, Luis started his career in the NYCDOE as a bilingual teacher with Teach for America. He earned a Master of Science degree from Pace University in 2003. In 2007, he graduated from Bank Street College's Teacher Leader Academy and served as an instructional coach and school leader. After graduating from Teachers College, Columbia University's Summer Principal Academy, in 2010, Luis became Director of Multilingual Learners and Family Engagement for most Districts 6 and 11 schools in New York City. In this role, he provided coaching and supervisory support to a network of 35 schools, building the capacity of Principals, MLL teacher leaders, and parent coordinators. In 2015, Luis joined the Bronx Field Support Center as an MLL Administrator for District 9. From 2015-17, he was responsible for addressing the instructional needs of District 9 MLL teachers and district- and school-level goals. In 2017, he served as Assistant Principal at Public School 73X. Since 2017, he's also worked as an adjunct professor of bilingual education at City and Hunter Colleges. He also serves on the Board of Directors for the New York State Association for Bilingual Education (NYSABE) and the Mott Hall Charter Network. Since 2020, Luis has been the proud Principal at P.S.126 in The Bronx and continues to lead for equity and systemic change. As Principal, Luis is a distinguished member of the Hunter College Gray Fellowship for Principal Excellence, and the Nationally recognized Cahn Fellowship.

Rita Joseph is a New York City Council Member elected in 2021 to represent Flatbush, Prospect Lefferts Gardens, Kensington, Ditmas Park, and Southern Crown Heights. Before serving on the City Council, Ms. Joseph was a public school teacher, a community activist, and a proud union member. After immigrating to the U.S. from Haiti in her youth, Ms. Joseph began her life of advocacy. At just 19 years old, she helped organize her first rally with a group, Haitian Enforcement Against Racism, to protest the FDA's discriminatory "bad blood" rules that prevented people of Haitian descent from donating blood. Along with much work of CBOs, doctors, researchers, and community activists, the rally succeeded in its mission, and the FDA rescinded the racist rule. Since this rally, which had more than 150,000 people participate, Ms. Joseph hasn't looked back on her activism. Despite being a teen mom who was only able to attend college because of a full tuition scholarship, Ms. Joseph spent her twenties raising her children while organizing protests against police brutality and cuts to student transit discounts, even while working a full-time job. Since then, she hasn't stopped working for her neighbors, both as a teacher at PS6 and as a community activist. Among many other successes, Ms. Joseph was able to provide for her school financially, securing hundreds of thousands of dollars for technological improvements that help thousands of children receive a better education, including funding from then-Borough President Eric Adams, Senator Kevin Parker, Assemblymember Rodneyse Bichotte, and then-Council Member Matthieu Eugene. Additionally, Ms. Joseph was appointed by State Senator Kevin Parker to serve as Chair of the Neighborhood Advisory Board and has been a part of the Citywide Participatory Budgeting Committee, thanks to an appointment by then-Council Speaker Corey Johnson. Council Member Joseph is focused on improving public schools, fighting for affordable housing, combatting the climate crisis, and achieving real criminal and social justice reform for New Yorkers.

Dr. Betty A. Rosa is the **Commissioner of Education** and President of the University of the State of New York. Dr. Rosa was appointed as permanent Commissioner on February 8, 2021, by the Board of Regents. She is the first Latina woman to serve in the position. Previously, Dr. Rosa served as Interim Commissioner since August 2020. Prior to that, she served as Chancellor of the Board of Regents since 2016. Dr. Rosa was elected by her Board of Regents colleagues as Chancellor in March 2016 and reelected for a second term in 2019. She was first elected to the Board of Regents for a five-year term in 2008, as the Regent for the Twelfth Judicial District (Bronx County), then re-elected for a second term in 2013 and a third term in 2018. Dr. Rosa is a nationally recognized education leader and received an Ed. M. and Ed. D. in Administration, Planning and Social Policy from Harvard University. She also holds two other Master of Science in Education degrees, one in Administration and Supervision and the other in Bilingual Education from the City College of New York and Lehman College, respectively, and a B.A. in psychology from the City College of New York. She has more than 30 years of instructional and administrative experience with an expertise in inclusive education, cooperative teaching models, student achievement, and policy implementation.

Dr. Lester W. Young, Jr. began his career with the New York City (NYC) Department of Education in 1969, holding positions as a Teacher, Guidance Counselor, Supervisor of Special Education and Principal. During his tenure as Principal, PS 183 Brooklyn (Ocean-Hill Brownsville) was recognized as a School of Excellence by the United States Department of Education (USDOE) and the New York State Education Department (NYSED) in 1987. Dr. Young also served as Assistant and Associate Commissioner with the NYSED (1988- 1993) and led the department's efforts in NYC. Dr. Young's portfolio included state-wide leadership responsibility for the Offices of School Improvement, Community Schools, Bilingual Education, and Migrant Services and Education. In 1993, returning to his Brooklyn roots, Dr. Young was appointed to the position of Community Superintendent, C.S.D. 13. As Superintendent, Dr. Young is credited for establishing two successful and highly sought-after schools (Benjamin Banneker Academy HS and Bedford Academy HS) as well as replicating the nationally recognized Algebra Project and Comer School Development Program. In 2000, Chancellor Harold Levy appointed Dr. Young as Senior Superintendent (coordinating services in four Central Brooklyn Community School Districts). He also established and led the first NYC Office of Youth Development and School Community Services. In 2004, after 35 years of NYC public school service, Lester W. Young, Jr. retired from the NYCDOE. During 2004 - 2008, Dr. Young held the position of Visiting Professor at Long Island University, Graduate School of Education, Brooklyn Campus.

Elisa Álvarez serves as the Associate Commissioner for the Office of Bilingual Education and World Languages. In this pivotal role, Ms. Álvarez adeptly guided schools through the challenging closures and reopening necessitated by the COVID-19 pandemic, ensuring that English Language Learners and all multilingual students continued to receive equitable access to high-quality instruction. Her achievements during this time included overseeing a remarkable 55% increase in the number of students receiving the New York State Seal of Biliteracy, spearheading the development of numerous resources to support the instruction and administration of ELL programs, and advocating for schools teaching Indigenous languages within New York State. With an impressive career spanning three decades in education, Ms. Álvarez has held several leadership positions, including serving as District 7 Community Superintendent and proudly serving as a Middle School Principal for a decade. Throughout her journey as a teacher and administrator, Ms. Álvarez has amassed extensive experience working with English language learners and students with disabilities. Ms. Álvarez is pursuing her doctorate at Russell Sage College and holds a Master's degree in School Administration and supervision from Touro College, a Master's degree in Special Education-Bilingual from Hunter College, and a bachelor's degree from Lehman College. Her dedication and commitment to enhancing the educational experience for diverse student populations exemplify her invaluable contributions to the field of education in New York State.

Patrick Mannion, NYSED Board of Regents (fifth Judicial District) served as vice chair of the Columbian Financial Group in Syracuse before his retirement in 2020 and currently is an active member of the Fayetteville Fire Department where he is a firefighter, emergency medical technician, lieutenant, and public information officer. In addition to his professional roles, Mr. Davis is also an active community leader. He also serves as a Board Member for the Central New York Regional Transportation Authority, focusing on transportation needs throughout Syracuse; as a Board of Director member for St. Joseph's School of Nursing; and as a Governing Board Member of VOICES for Youth, a newly-formed non-profit organization devoted to improving the community. Previously, he served as a Board of Director member of the Southwest Community Center, and as a Co-Founder of Brother to Brother, a youth outreach program designed to pair successful and respected members of the community with troubled youth.

Language is not just a means of communication for expressing thoughts and emotions, it is a cultural identity. We all have values and societal norms. It plays an important role in human relations and the preservation of the collective knowledge of society across generations.
